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INTRODUCTION

Our current world climate is constantly connected to technology. Is your smartphone the first thing you look at each morning and the last thing you check each night? Given the persuasive designs of social media platforms and the internet, it is no surprise that screen time steadily increases for most of us year after year. It is important, though, how we tend to see device *addiction* more amongst today's youth – it seems as though younger children, teens, and young adults are constantly staring at some kind of device or screen.

Educating ourselves and today's youth on the current digital landscape may seem overwhelming at times. Technology has entered our lives at a rapid pace over the past several years and continues to evolve daily. The reality is that even as apps and technological devices change, individual behavior often remains the same. Today's youth spend on average nearly five hours a day on social media, with evidence noting a direct correlation towards negative mental health for our students.¹

Given the significant level of individual engagement, it is evident that social media is here to stay and will continue to impact our daily lives and school communities. We must recognize that the internet and social media platforms serve as primary channels for student interaction, communication, and engagement. Unfortunately, it may also be the primary way for youth to engage in cyberbullying behaviors, or to threaten and harass each other.

The goal of the School Administrator's Guide is to familiarize yourself with the major social media platforms currently used by your students, or platforms that have a strong potential to be used by your students. In addition, the guide provides essential information pertaining to Texas laws. Ensuring you are increasingly more and more familiar with social media platforms allows you to navigate through them quickly when addressing digital threats and other worrisome online behavior. Being prepared is a vital part of your school's safety and may prevent tragic incidents from impacting your community.

A note for school administrators: There has been a recent rise in [doxxing](#) concerns specifically targeting school administrators. With the rapid expansion of internet access and online platforms, individuals in leadership roles are increasingly vulnerable to having personal information exposed. To help safeguard your privacy, it is important to regularly search your name online and review your digital tattoo. Additionally, ensure your social media accounts are secured with strong privacy settings to minimize the risk of personal information being shared without your consent.

THE ESSENTIALS

Many components of the online world are generally known and understood by most digital users; however, here are three essential terms that we need to understand to take control of our digital responsibility:

1. Hashtag
 - A hashtag is a symbol (#) added before a word or phrase to create a searchable category indexed by social media and becomes discoverable by other users. Hashtags are a way of making it easier to find, follow, and contribute to a conversation, and a hashtag forms a specific online community for individuals to connect under.
2. Username
 - A username is a unique online identity that is chosen to represent someone online. Most platforms make you choose a username when you create an account. This is different from an individual's vanity/display name, which is not unique to a user.
3. Passwords
 - We all know the challenge of trying to remember our password for a website or an app, and it is easy to fall into habits of using the same passwords for all our logins. This is a dangerous habit, especially if it is something easily guessable, such as a dog, or our kid's name or their birthday. We should remind our children not to share their passwords with their friends.
 - Use different passwords for each platform you have an account for and make sure that they are strong with a mix of numbers, letters, and special characters (!@#\$%^&*).
 - HINT: Try a password manager! There are many free apps available. A password manager stores your passwords on a digital keychain and can help you manage passwords (especially really strong ones), so you do not have to!

TEXAS LAWS

David's Law

Texas lawmakers got to work creating stricter bullying laws after David Molak, age 16, died by suicide in 2016 in San Antonio, after he endured relentless cyberbullying. The bill passed with a unanimous vote, and in June 2017, Governor Greg Abbott signed David's Law into law, allowing school districts, police, and prosecutors to fight cyberbullying on multiple fronts, with expanded definitions and tools.

Texas Education Code 37.0832 defines bullying as a single significant act or a pattern of acts by one or more students directed at another student that exploits an imbalance of power. The law further expands the definition as listed below:

Texas Bullying Defined

- Consists of all forms of communication
- Includes off-campus actions and communications that interfere with a student's educational opportunities, or significantly disrupt the school environment
- No longer needs to be a pattern; it can be a single significant act
- Schools must have a bullying police, an anonymous and regular reporting system, and protect staff and students who report bullying
- Authorities may be notified, and parents or guardians must be notified
- Allows a court to issue a temporary restraining order, temporary injunction, or permanent injunction to prevent any further cyberbullying by the guilty minor or the parent or guardian of the guilty minor may be compelled to take reasonable actions to cause the minor under their care to cease engaging in cyberbullying
- Allows transfer of students to another school when necessary
- All school counsellors, teachers, nurses, administrators, and other staff, as well as law enforcement officers and social workers who regularly interact with students, must receive training in suicide, bullying, and harassment and maintain a record of that training
- Districts must provide prevention

Texas Penal Code 42.07 states that an individual commits the offense of harassment when he or she acts with intent to harass, embarrass, torment, alarm, abuse or annoy someone else.

Under the Education Code, school districts are required by law to adopt policies to prevent 'bullying.' 'Harassment' is a criminal offense, either in school or out of school.

Texas Sexting Laws Involving Young People

Sexting is a crime in Texas, even if no adult is involved. Under Texas Penal Code Section 43.261, it is a crime for a minor to "intentionally or knowingly" send another minor an obscene photo/video or a photo/video of a minor engaging in sexual conduct, if they know it was a minor. First-time offenses are punishable by a Class C misdemeanor, but the statute indicates that under some circumstances, a first-time offender can be charged with a Class B misdemeanor.

In 2019, the Texas Legislature added Penal Code 21.19, which states that a Class C misdemeanor is

committed by a person if they knowingly transmit electronic visual material that depicts any person engaging in sexual conduct, or with the person's intimate parts exposed, that is not sent at the request of or with the express consent of the recipient. This applies to all electronic platforms, such as e-mail, texts, apps, and social media.

Texas Revenge Porn Law

In 2015, the Texas Legislature passed Texas Penal Code Section 21.16, the "Revenge Porn Statute." In 2017, this law was amended, updating the penalty from a Class A Misdemeanor to a state jail felony for someone to reveal or disclose images of someone engaged in sexual conduct, or images of someone's intimate parts, unless that person gives their consent when that person had a reasonable expectation that the material would remain private.

Texas Sextortion Laws

Texas Penal Code 33.021 makes it a felony offense to solicit anyone under the age of 17 (a minor), or anyone the offender believes to be under the age of 17, online for sexual contact or to have sexually explicit communication with a minor, or someone they believe to be a minor.

Texas Penal Code 33.07 states that if a person "uses the name or persona of another person" without that person's consent and with the intent to harm, threaten, defraud, or intimidate the person, then he or she has committed a felony offense.

Texas Penal Code 21.18 defines sexual coercion as an act involving sexual conduct causing arousal or gratification. This section applies to a threat regardless of how that threat is communicated, including a threat transmitted through e-mail or an Internet website, social media account, or chat room and a threat made by other electronic or technological means. Such action is a felony offense.

Texas Child Pornography Law

Texas Penal Code 43.26 states that it is a felony crime, up to the first degree, for an adult to knowingly or intentionally possess or access with the intent to view material that depicts a child under the age of 18 engaging in sexual conduct. This includes sexting with a minor.

TEXAS SCHOOL LAWS

In the past, sexting, bullying, or harassment may have been minimized, not taken seriously, or swept under the rug. However, there are now laws in place that Texas schools must follow. These laws have been created to protect students and schools have a legal obligation to protect them. These laws include:

Criminal Mischief, Possession of Weapons or Narcotics and Distribution, and Gang-Related Conduct

Texas Education Code 37.123 (a) states that a person commits an offense if the person, alone or in concert with others, intentionally engages in disruptive activity on the campus or property of any private or public school.

Texas Penal Code 28.03 provides that a person commits criminal mischief when: without the effective consent of the owner, he or she intentionally or knowingly damages or destroys the tangible property of the owner.

FEDERAL LAWS

When it comes to laws on sexting between minors, the Federal Juvenile Delinquency Act (FJDA) in Title 18 United States Code Section 5032 provides that, where possible, juveniles should be prosecuted in state, not federal, courts. However, there are federal provisions for adults that are relevant to our discussion, and that young people should be aware of so they know how they are protected and when they should reach out to law enforcement.

Title 18 United States Code Section 1466A(a), (b), and (c); and Title 18 United States Code Section 2252A(b)(2) explain that anyone who “knowingly produces, distributes, receives, or possesses with intent to distribute, a visual depiction of any kind, including a drawing, cartoon, sculpture, or painting that depicts a minor engaging in sexually explicit conduct, and is obscene,” or who “knowingly possesses” a visual depiction described above is subject to the penalties provided by law. Please note that the minor depicted does not need to actually exist.

Title 18 United States Code Section 1470 prohibits any individual from knowingly transferring or attempting to transfer obscene matter using the U.S. mail or any means or facility of interstate or foreign commerce to a minor under 16 years old. Convicted offenders face fines and imprisonment for up to 10 years.

Child sex trafficking is prohibited by Title 18 United States Code Section 1591. It is a federal offense to knowingly recruit, entice, harbor, transport, provide, obtain, or maintain a minor (defined as someone under 18 years of age) knowing or in reckless disregard of the fact that the victim is a minor and would be caused to engage in a commercial sex act.

Federal law also prohibits the production, distribution, reception, and possession of an image of child pornography using or affecting any means or facility of interstate or foreign commerce (Title 18 United States Code Section 2251; Title 18 United States Code Section 2252; and Title 18 United States Code Section 2252A). Specifically, Section 2251 makes it illegal to persuade, induce, entice, or coerce a minor to engage in sexually explicit conduct for purposes of producing visual depictions of that conduct. Any individual who attempts or conspires to commit a child pornography offense is also subject to prosecution under federal law.

SEXTING VERSUS SEXTORTION

There is no doubt that we are seeing a tremendous impact that smartphones are having on our everyday lives. The use of text messaging specifically has skyrocketed since the influence of smartphones.

The term 'sexting' has emerged as the use of text messages to send sexually explicit photographs and messages. Sexting is also commonly done over popular apps such as Facebook Messenger and Instagram Direct Messages, but we have seen it widely popularized through Snapchat due to its ability to send photographs and messages that can only be seen once for only seconds before they "disappear" into cyberspace. According to the Texas Penal Code, sexting is defined as the sending of texts containing sexual images or sexually suggestive language to another person.

Though sexting may seem harmless to those engaging in the practice, sexting or sending explicit and provocative messages and photos to another person could lead to legal trouble, especially among teenagers. As the practice has grown in popularity over the past few years, criminal law attorneys such as the Brownsville Texas Criminal Law Attorneys are seeing more instances where those engaging in the activity end up facing legal consequences. Teenagers who are considering or are engaging in sexting should pay special attention to their state laws around sexting as the state laws in Texas are frequently updated and could leave them with a criminal record.

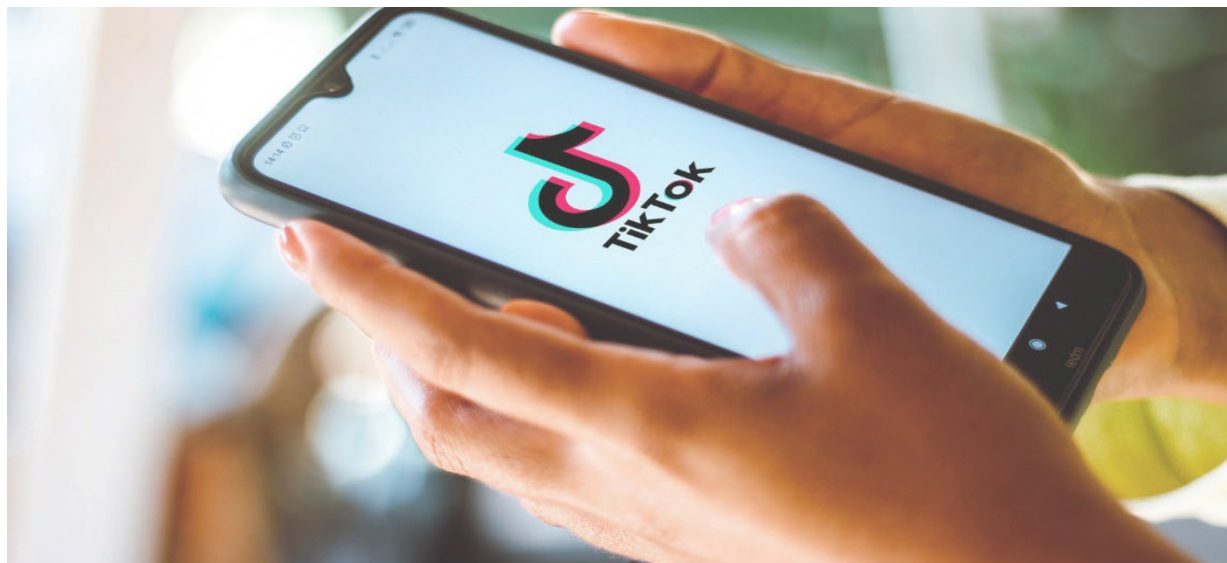
In Texas, teen sexting falls under state law against electronically transmitted sexual images of children. It is illegal for a minor to electronically send images of an individual under the age of 18, even if the images are of the person who sent them or is the recipient. The definition encompasses everything from explicit photos to descriptions of sexual or lewd acts, whether they are sent to a willing recipient partaking in the sexting or to someone else as a threat or form of harassment.

When engaging in sexting, it is important to be knowledgeable not only about the laws but also why the laws are in place. Sexting has its dangers to acknowledge how it can permanently impact the lives of our youth. One of the most dangerous scenarios that we see occur repeatedly, especially in teenagers, is sextortion. Sextortion is when non-physical forms of coercion are used to extort non-consensual sexual favors from the victim. Sextortion can happen to anyone who chooses to sext – it is not always a stranger you have never met, it can also be someone close to you. It is crucial to understand that when you choose to engage in sexting, you are subjecting yourself to sextortion.

POPULAR SOCIAL MEDIA APPS

Today, there are many social media applications available, and chances are, you or someone you know has one or more of these apps on their smartphone. You likely know how to use some of these apps better than others. This guide will thoroughly introduce the most popular social media apps used by today's youth.

TikTok



TikTok is currently one of the world's most popular video-sharing social networking applications. The platform is centered around individuals posting short videos accompanied by popular songs or sounds. TikTok reigned as the most downloaded app globally in 2024² and has been downloaded 4.92 billion times across iOS and Android devices.³ With over 1.6 billion monthly active users,⁴ despite several incidents of data breach allegations⁵ and being banned in several countries,⁶ TikTok is not going away anytime soon.

TikTok strategically markets to younger audiences, and although users must be 13 years of age to sign up for the app, content on the platform is not filtered. Individuals ranging from 10 to 19 years old may have access to age-inappropriate content, wherein access to this content could potentially extend to even younger viewers. Age-inappropriate content inevitably reaches 37.3% of its estimated audience who are under the age of 18,⁷ as well as audiences who are potentially younger than the required 13 years of age, as you can lie about your age.

The average time a user spends on TikTok is 95 minutes per day,⁸ an increase from an average of two years prior, which was 46 minutes.⁹ This time is spent either creating and sharing short videos or watching the existing plethora of TikTok videos already uploaded to the platform. Either way, the average time a user spends on TikTok is nearly 100 minutes every day.

In addition to its popularity among today's youth, TikTok is also seeing a growing number of adults joining the platform. More than 44% of users are between the ages of 20-39 years old.¹⁰ Consequently, adults who join the app may not always prioritize creating a safe environment for TikTok's younger users. It is possible that some adults may not be aware that their posted content is visible to youth of all ages. While TikTok outlines in its Community Guidelines that inappropriate content or content violating the platform's rules will be removed by moderators, such actions may take hours or even days to occur, or may not happen at all.¹¹ TikTok's Terms of Services allow for the possibility of moderation, but in effect, there is not much oversight, and removing inappropriate content may be a lengthy process.¹² This is particularly significant given that more than one billion TikTok videos are viewed every day.¹³

With the rising popularity of video-sharing apps, there are alternatives to TikTok worth mentioning, such as Triller—an American-based app boasting over 73 million downloads and offering features similar to TikTok.¹⁴ Other alternatives include but are not limited to Byte, Likee, and Funimate. Below, we will explore further and discover more about TikTok's features.

FOR YOU PAGE (FYP)

Each TikTok user has their own unique preference for the type of video content they enjoy watching the most. TikTok's algorithm assesses these preferences and subsequently delivers the content to the user's customized For You Page (FYP). TikTok published a detailed [blog post](#)¹⁵ about how individual FYP recommendations are generated.¹⁶ As outlined in the blog post, the FYP's algorithm is based on the preferences and activity history of individual users, including:

- Video likes
- Video shares
- Accounts followed
- Comments posted
- Videos created

Information such as the duration of a video watched by a user plays a role in shaping the algorithm. Viewing a video in its entirety indicates significant interest and holds importance. Additionally, other contributing factors encompass:

- Length/runtime

- Captions
- Sounds
- Stickers
- Hashtags (#)

Furthermore, hashtags influence the type of content users see on their FYP. Users who watch or create videos with a particular hashtag are more inclined to encounter content featuring the same hashtag in the future.

Lastly, TikTok has stated it takes a user's device settings and account settings into consideration when recommending content.¹⁷ Some examples of similar settings include:

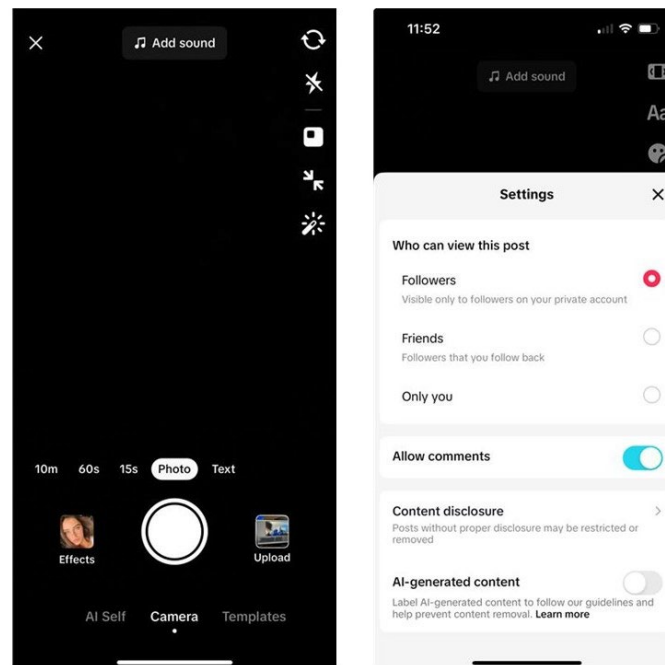
- Language preferences
- Country settings
- Device type

However, these factors do not hold as much weight compared to the amount of time spent watching videos and user activity.

TIKTOK FEATURES

TikTok requires that users grant permission for the app to access their device's camera and microphone. Once granted permission, users are given the capability to upload content, including previously recorded videos or images from their device library.

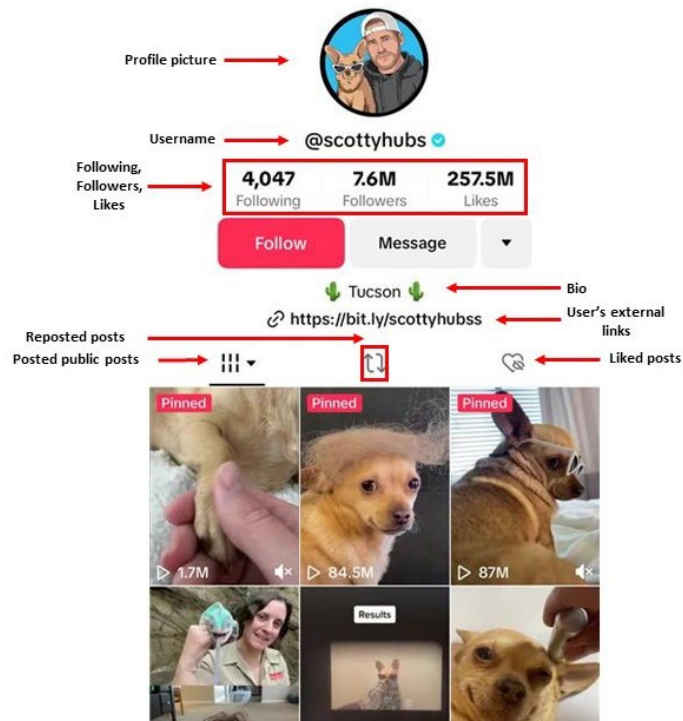
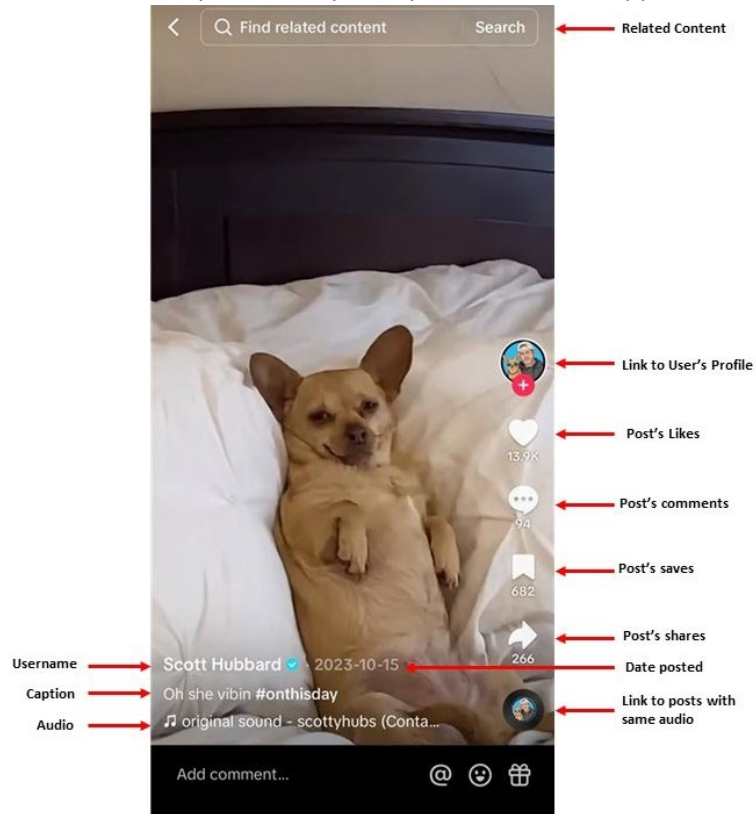
Consequently, TikTok allows for the re-upload of videos that were previously removed from the app, regardless of whether they were deleted by the user or removed due to a violation of TikTok's Terms of Services.



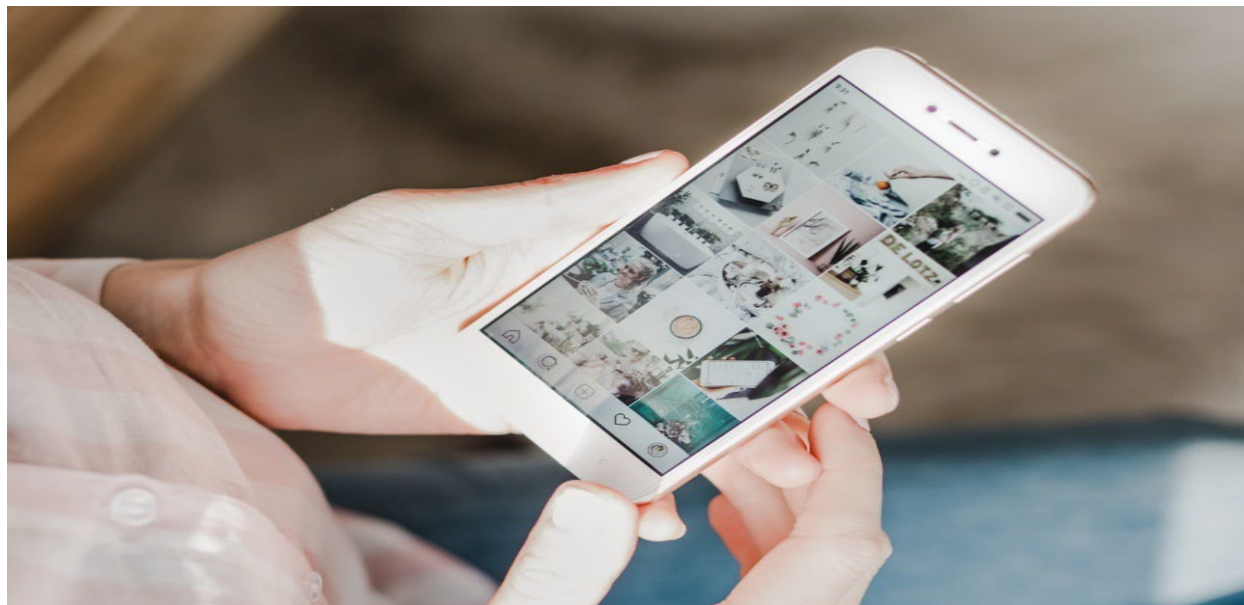

ANATOMY OF TIKTOK

Together, let us look at the anatomy of TikTok posts, profiles, and the app's comment sections.



Instagram



Instagram, owned by Meta, is a widely used photo-sharing platform with over 1 billion monthly active users.¹⁸ If you see a student scrolling through photos on their smartphone, chances are they are browsing through Instagram.

Similar to TikTok, hashtags are often used on this platform. These hashtags provide users with a means to discover and follow other users who share similar interests.

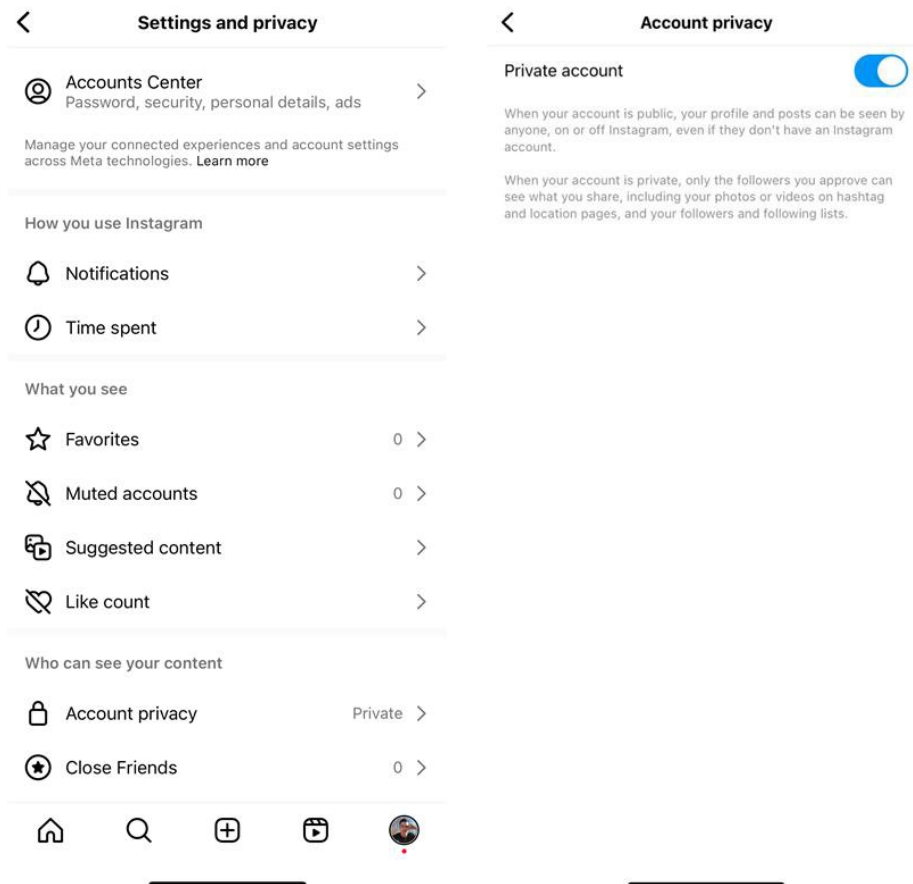

SUGGESTED PRIVACY

On Instagram, users can choose to share posts with either everyone, by maintaining a public account, or exclusively with approved followers, by setting their account to private.

SST recommends that all students maintain a private Instagram account for safety purposes. However, an exception may apply to grade 11-12 students who aim to cultivate their digital presence and create an account that university recruiters and employers can access. Instructions on enabling a private account can be found below.



INSTAGRAM STORIES

Instagram Stories allow users to share videos and/or photos publicly or with their followers; these posts remain visible for 24 hours. Additionally, users can send videos and/or photos that vanish after being viewed once. There is also the option to post poll questions, messages, locations, and other users can comment on the Instagram story. This feature, inspired by the widespread usage of Snapchat, became widely popular among younger users. Additionally, users have the ability to track who has viewed and/or engaged with their content if they post an Instagram Story. Furthermore, Instagram users can post photos/videos to their “Stories” for only their “Close Friends” list to see – a list the individual user creates on Instagram.

INSTAGRAM REELS

Instagram Reels were added as a feature in 2020 and were originally 15 seconds long.¹⁹ These are short videos with music included, remarkably similar to the style of TikTok videos. Instagram Reels can now be up to 90 seconds and can also be cross shared on Meta's other platform, Facebook. Instagram Reels are the fastest-growing feature of Instagram worldwide and are expected to have over 2.35 billion users each month.²⁰ Instagram reels rival TikTok, surrounding posting short videos to which users have an endless scroll of options to see; the platform utilizes this persuasive design so users can always stay on Instagram instead of switching to TikTok. School administrators should recognize Reels as a powerful medium for student expression, potentially useful for educational projects and fostering a positive school culture online; however, there remains the possibility of worrisome content being posted on a user's Reels, too.

THREADS

Threads is a recent addition to Instagram, introduced as a new option for conversation (similar to X, formerly known as Twitter), where users can engage in real-time conversations. Threads offers the ability to post messages with a 500-character limit and videos with a duration of up to 5 minutes. Users are prompted to sign up for Threads through their existing Instagram account, enabling users to also share posts from Threads directly to their Instagram Stories. Threads has over 175 million monthly users and 33 million daily users, and within its first five days of launch, 100 million users created accounts.²¹

DIRECT MESSAGES (DMS)

Instagram has the option for users to communicate one-to-one by messaging privately. Direct Messaging, or 'DMs,' is a private message inbox within the Instagram app. This is a feature that allows users to communicate privately, like text messaging, or also the option to create group chats to communicate with multiple users at once. Yes, Instagram DMs are where our youth receive private messages from their friends and participate in group chats, but there is also the possibility that they may receive messages from strangers. Furthermore, there is currently no way to disable Instagram DMs.

If you do not follow a user, yet they message you, this is filtered into a section called Message Requests. Within this section, there is further filtration to 'Hidden Requests,' where Instagram may hide a DM from your generic Message Requests screen if it deems the message as potentially inappropriate.

It is important to note that photos, videos, and voice recordings can be sent through Instagram DMs, including from accounts that are not mutual (do not follow the user/the user does not follow them). Additionally, users can enable "Vanish Mode," similar to Snapchat's disappearing messages feature, which "deletes" chats after a recipient views them.²²

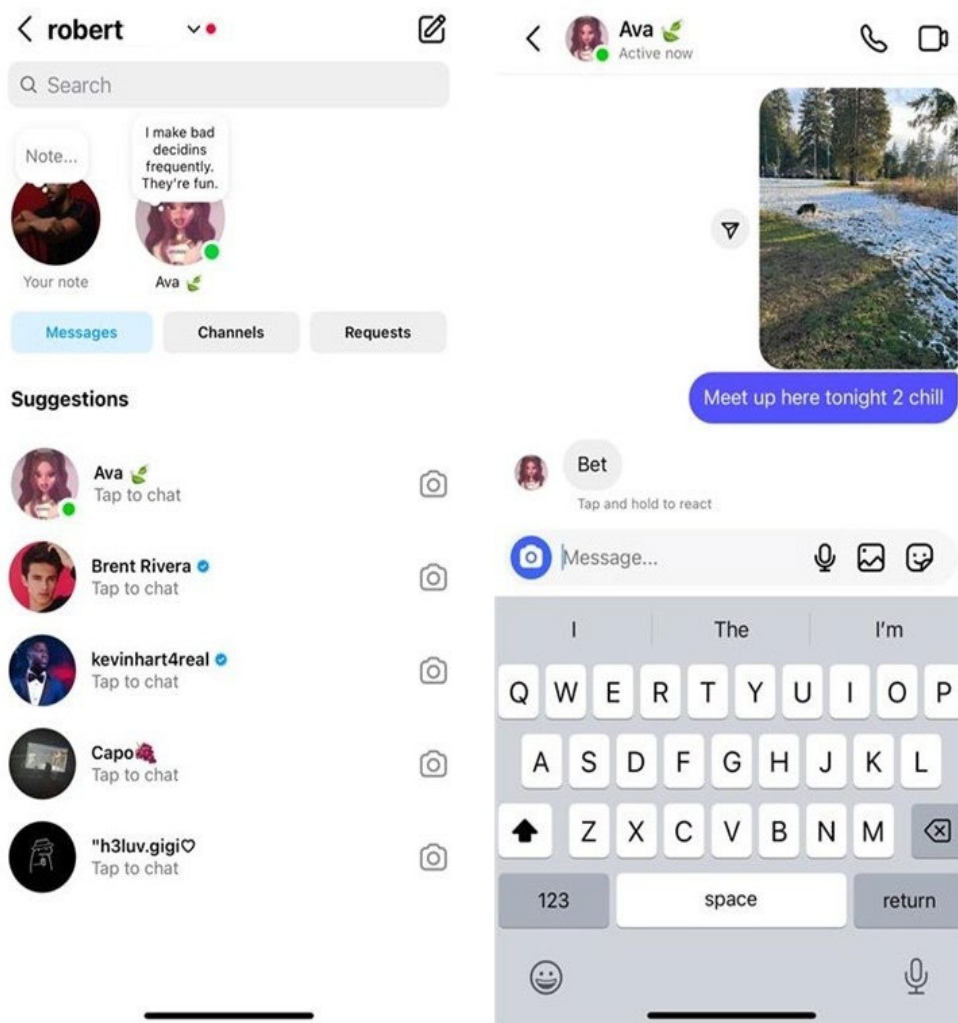

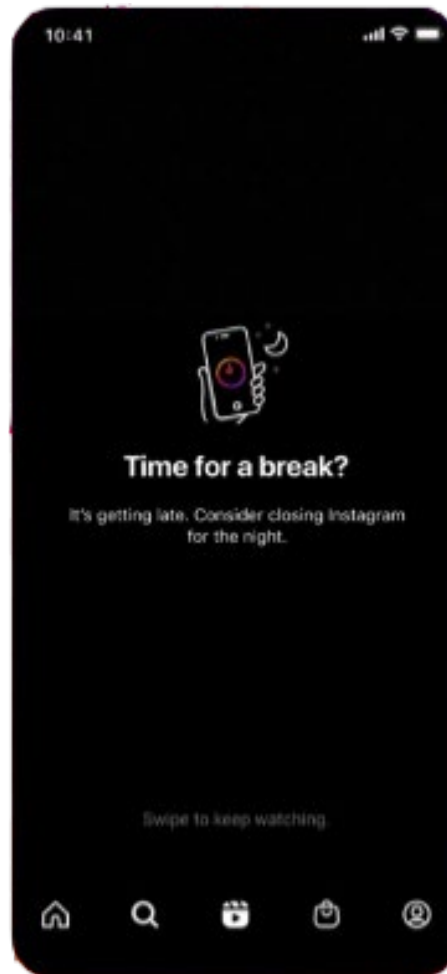
INSTAGRAM NOTES

Instagram's Notes feature permits individuals to post brief, 60-character messages that remain visible for 24 hours. This feature fosters a private communication channel between youth and their peers. It is important for school administrators to be aware of this tool, as it enables students to share quick updates or thoughts, potentially impacting the dynamics of student interactions.



NIGHTTIME NUDGES

Instagram's Nighttime Nudges is a recent addition aimed at encouraging today's youth to reduce their late-night usage of the app. When a user between the ages of 13 and 17 spends more than 10 minutes on Instagram, especially in sections like Reels or DMs during late hours, they will receive a gentle reminder suggesting it is time for a break.²³ These nudges are programmed to appear automatically after 10 p.m. and cannot be disabled, although users can dismiss them.²⁴ This initiative is part of Instagram's broader efforts to promote healthier usage habits among today's youth, complementing other features on Instagram such as 'Take a Break' and 'Quiet Mode.'

Snapchat (“Snap”)



Since its launch in 2011, Snapchat has consistently maintained its status as one of the most popular social media applications among today’s youth, serving as a primary platform for communication and sharing digital experiences. Its popularity stems from transforming text communication into a visual experience, allowing users to send photos that disappear without leaving evidence, thus minimizing their digital tattoos – for the most part. Around 40% of Snapchat’s userbase is under 18, and 82% of United States teenagers use Snapchat at least once a month.²⁵

According to [Snapchat’s Terms of Service](#), users must be 13 years of age to register. However, the absence of age verification makes it relatively simple for individuals under the age of 13 to create an account.

At the core of Snapchat lies the concept of disappearing photos or videos, which vanish after being opened. Users can set a viewing time of as little as 1 second up to 24 hours, after which, once viewed, the image or video is deleted from the recipient’s device and from Snapchat’s servers, as the company claims.²⁶

Snapchat allows users to take still photos, record short videos, add text, create drawings, and send this content to a personalized, and typically private list of friends. However, there is nothing currently in place that prevents a recipient from taking a screenshot or using a different device to take a picture of the image or video.

Note: if you take a screenshot or screen record using the recipient device, within Snapchat, it will notify the sender that you have recorded a copy of the content.

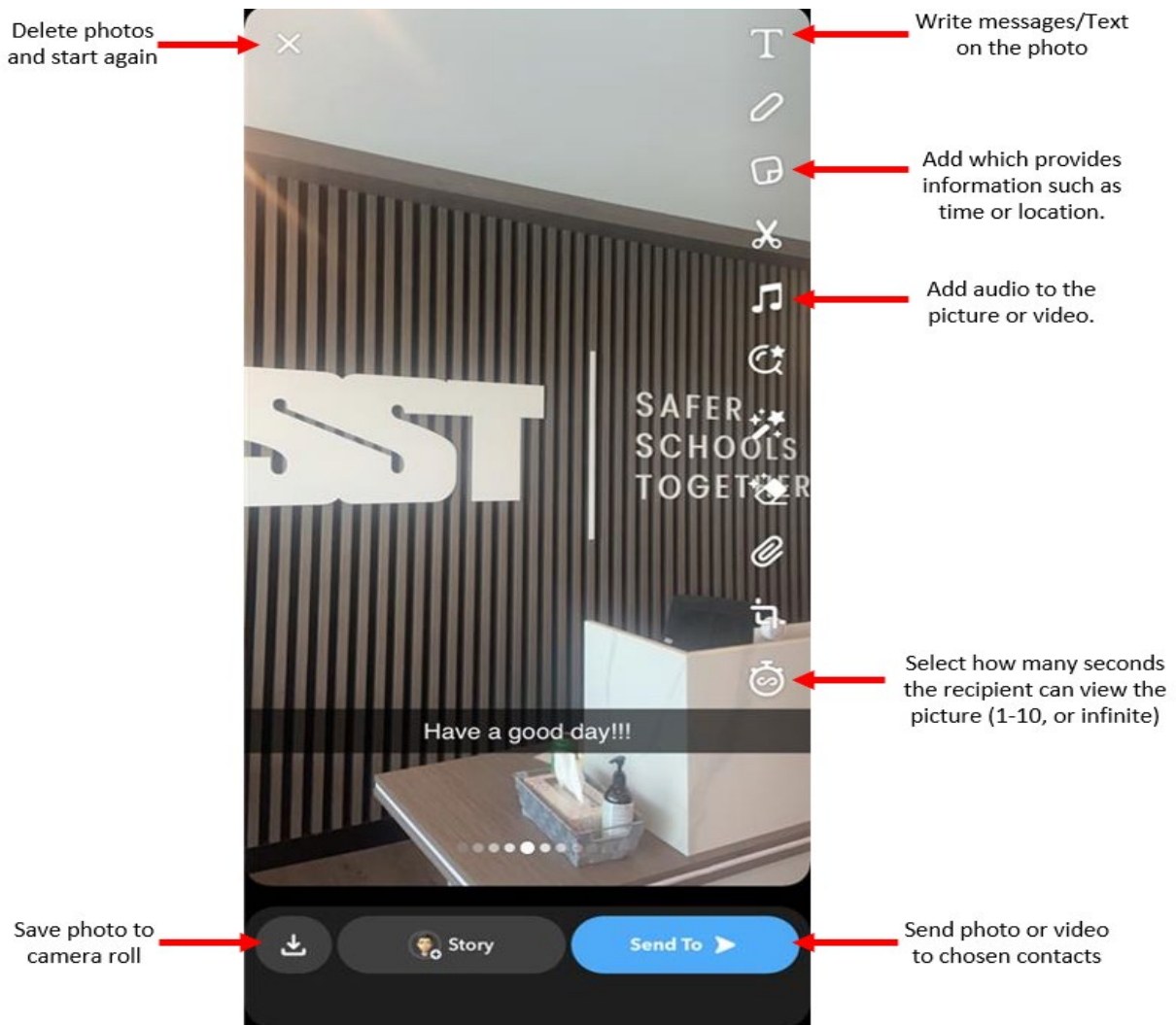

SNAPCHAT LINGO

Snaps

A user captures a photo or video using their digital device or smartphone in real time. They have the option to set a viewing duration between 1 and 10 seconds or opt for an infinite viewing time for the recipient. Additionally, users can choose whether to save the photo or video to their device's photo gallery, their '[My Eyes Only](#)' folder, or send it via Snapchat without saving it locally.

After taking a photo on Snapchat, you will see:



Stories

A user can add photo(s)/video(s) to their Snapchat story. Depending on the user's privacy settings, photo(s)/video(s) added to a story can be viewed for up to 24 hours by all Snapchat users (See Snap Map below), just those on their friends' list, or even a more specified list of their friends that the user chooses.

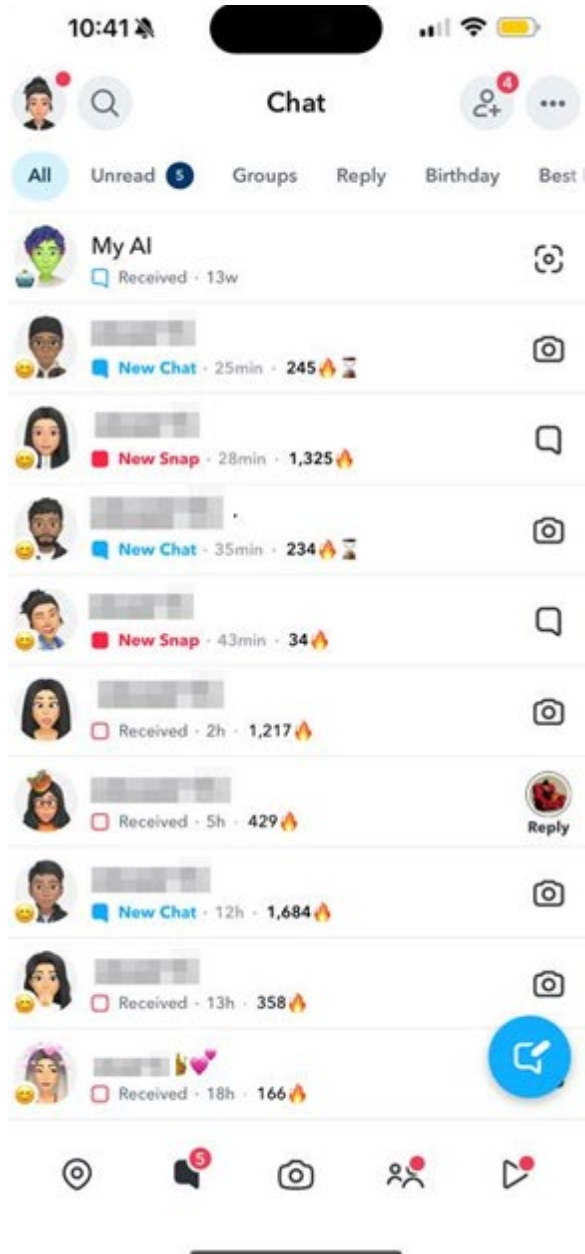
Spotlight

Spotlight is a new dedicated tab where users can see short-form videos, much like Instagram Reels or TikTok videos. Users have up to 60 seconds to create Spotlight Snaps for the public to see.

Chat

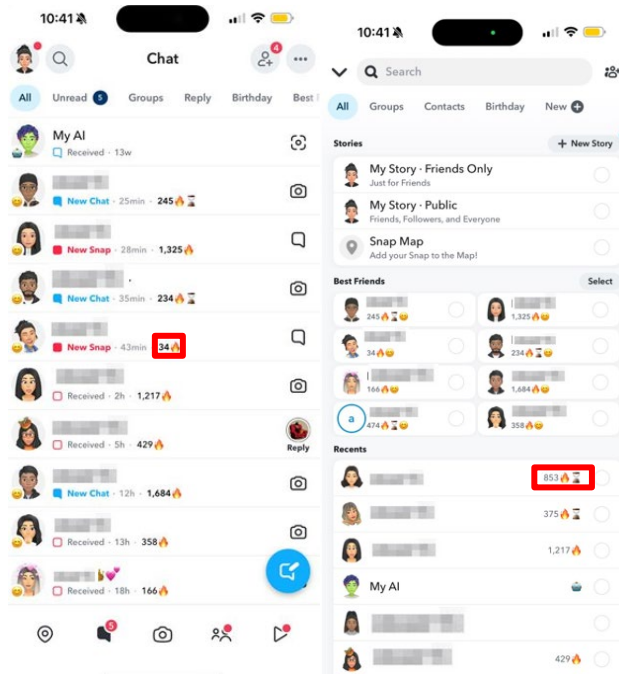
Using this feature, users can send direct messages, similar to text messages, to their friends within the Snapchat app. After both parties have viewed the message, it will disappear. It is worth noting that within each conversation, users can manually adjust the chat settings to make messages disappear after 24 hours instead. Additionally, photos from the user's local device or Snapchat gallery can be uploaded and sent within the chat feature. Group chats often exist between multiple friends. It is important that you are aware that many of the negative group interactions we may see as Administrators within the school have the potential to arise from negative interactions within Snapchat group chats that occur often outside of school hours.

Below is an example of what the Snapchat Chat screen could potentially look like within a Snapchat account.



Streaks

Seen within the chat log screen, a user's "Snapchat Streak" is the number of consecutive days the account owner and a friend have sent at least but no less than one Snap per day to each other. If they do not snap each other in 24 hours, they will lose their streak with that particular user. This is a huge deal for our youth – we have seen students avoid field trips or travelling to places where they cannot access their phones in order to keep up these streaks. Connected with snap streaks is when an emoji of an hourglass next to a streak may appear, which means the users will lose their streak soon if they do not snap each other, indicating the time period is closing in on 24 hours since they last snapped. Below is an example of what streaks look like on both pages of Snapchat. The red box outlines what a streak looks like.



Bitmoji

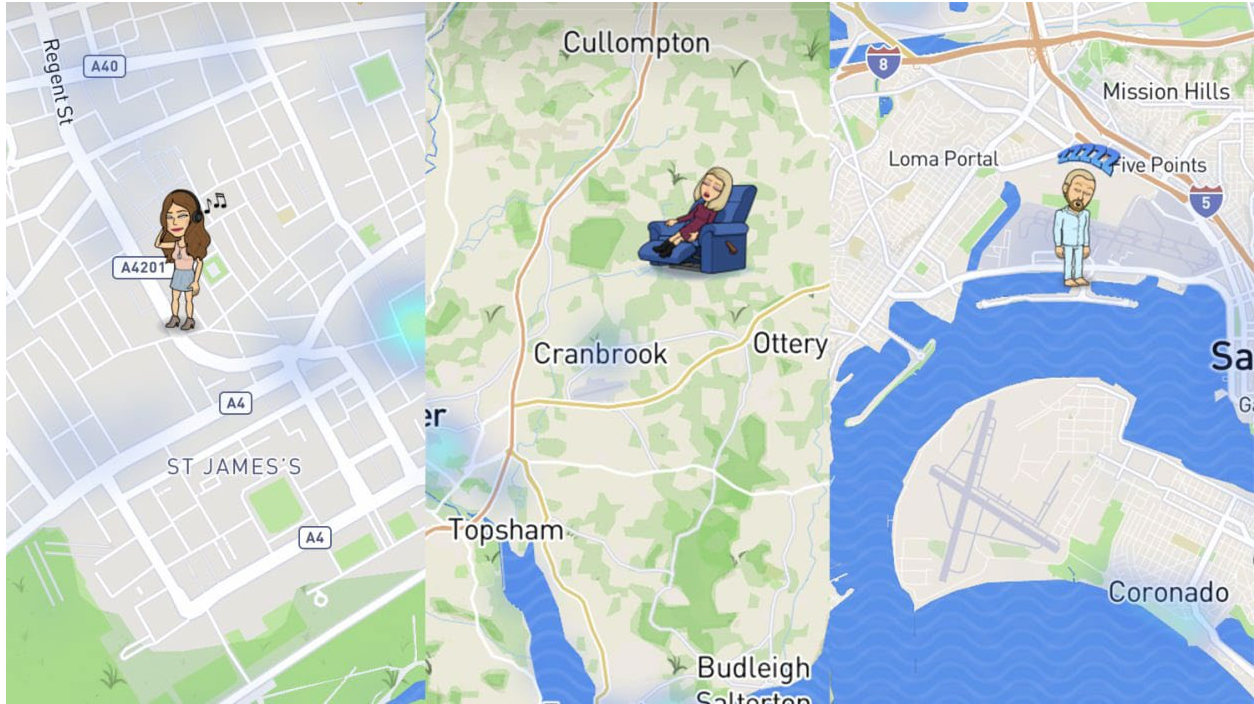
Owned by Snap Inc., users are encouraged to create an avatar, known as a Bitmoji. A Bitmoji is a personalized emoji-like character designed to reflect the user's likeness. Users can personalize their avatar by changing hair texture, facial expressions, and body proportions. To further personalize their avatar, users can choose specific outfits that better portray their personal style.

Discover Page

Snapchat's Discover page allows users to access a variety of Stories from publishers and other subscriptions tailored to their interests. To navigate to the Discover page, users simply swipe left while on the camera screen.

Snap Map

Snapchat features a tool called Snap Map, where users can explore Snaps from various events such as sporting events, celebrations, and breaking news. Additionally, a new Snap Map feature called Places enables users to tag specific locations, including schools, restaurants, malls, or public spaces, when posting a public story. The most concerning aspect of the Snap Map is the ability to view the real-time locations of your friends on the map. Users can share their locations with all their "friends," allowing others to see their current activities, such as driving, sleeping, or listening to music.

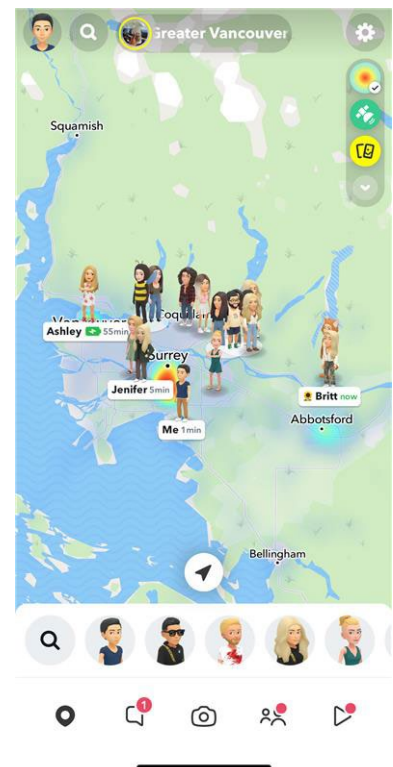


Here is an example of what the Snap Map looks like to a user from the mobile application while logged into their account. The user's friends are represented by the [Bitmoji](#) that they designed.

Within the Snapchat Settings, users can turn off the ability for others to see their location by enabling something called Ghost Mode or only allowing their location to be viewed by certain friends (i.e., their best friend) and/or parents/caregivers or other trusted adults.

Ghost Mode is a full privacy mode that makes a user's presence on the Snap Map invisible to other users. This disallows other users from viewing their location, including users on their friend list.

The Snap Map is often used by SST Threat Analysts and law enforcement to find missing students by asking their peers to share their Snap Map with us.



MY AI

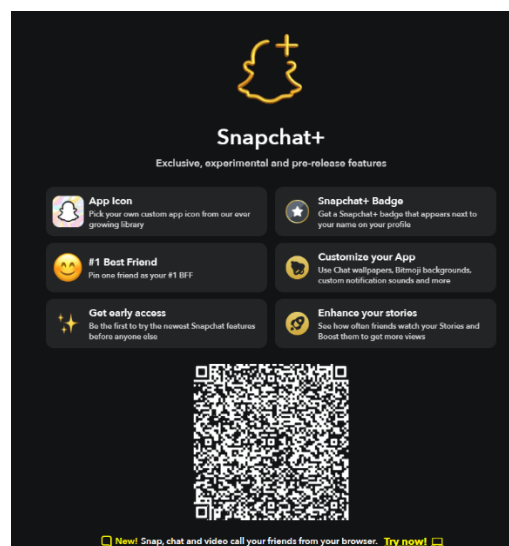
As the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) increases, we have seen a surge in the development of new AI services, specifically within social media. Most recently, Snapchat rolled out its own AI bot, called My AI. My AI was created to foster creativity and connections with friends, receive real-world recommendations, and learn more about their interests.²⁷ The new AI bot is powered by OpenAI's ChatGPT technology but has additional safety enhancements and controls that are unique to Snapchat.²⁸ With My AI, users can leverage a variety of AI capabilities. Unless you sign up and pay for Snapchat+, there is no verified way, nor has SST found a way to permanently remove My AI from a user's Snapchat account.²⁹

SNAPCHAT +

In 2022, Snapchat released a subscription-based feature called Snapchat+. This monthly subscription is accessed within the Snapchat app and offers a collection of exclusive features.

According to Snapchat, the “subscription will allow [them] to deliver new Snapchat features to some of the most passionate members of [their] community and allow [them] to provide prioritized support.”³⁰

There are several unique features of Snapchat+, which include priority story replies, allowing a Snapchat+ user's posts to become more visible on the platform. Snapchat+ users can also assign a specific emoji for friends to show they have viewed their Snaps, add custom backgrounds for their Bitmojis, and change the look of the Snapchat icon on the home screen of their device. In addition, Snapchat+ users can set time lengths to send a photo to as short as .10, .25 and .50 of a second.



SNAPCHAT FOR WEB

In 2022, Snapchat released Snapchat for Web, which allows users to access the Snapchat application from their PC or laptop via <https://web.snapchat.com>. This new feature includes most of the same features as the mobile version, including posting, direct messaging, group chats, video sharing, and voice calling. Snapchat users who already have accounts can log in to the web version with the same credentials they use on their mobile devices, or can sign up for a new account on the web. Once either mobile or desktop applications are synced, users can continue their conversations with other Snapchat users.

To use Snapchat for Web, users are required to give the application access to a webcam and/or microphone for users to post, video, and voice call. If the user does not grant access or does not have a

webcam or microphone available, they will still be able to text chat on the application. As well, please know that you will not be able to access the Snap Map via the Snapchat Web version.

FRIEND EMOJI ICON GUIDE

Friend Emojis are determined by Snapchat to keep track of the status of a user's friends. These can change over time based on the interactions between users. Below is a screenshot of the default Snapchat Friend Emojis that have specific meanings; however, users are able to customize these emojis to their personal preference in the settings of Snapchat.

Super BFF

You have been each other's #1 [Best Friend](#) for two months in a row. This is getting serious!

BFF

You have been each other's #1 Best Friend for two weeks in a row. Aww!

Besties

You are each other's #1 Best Friend. You sent the most Snaps to this Snapchatter, and they sent the most Snaps to you, too.

BFs

They're one of your Best Friends! You send a lot of Snaps to this Snapchatter, but they're not your #1 Best Friend.

Mutual Besties

Your #1 Best Friend is also their #1 Best Friend.

Mutual BFs

One of your Best Friends is also one of this Snapchatter's Best Friends!

Snapstreak!

You're on a [Snapstreak!](#) This appears next to the number of days that you and a friend have continually Snapped each other.

Snapstreak is ending

Your Snapstreak is going to end soon! Both you and your friend need to send a Snap to each other within 24 hours, or you'll lose your Snapstreak. Chats and Snaps sent in Groups don't count!

Birthday

It's your friend's [birthday!](#) This appears next to your friend's name on the date they entered as their birthday on Snapchat.

X (formally known as Twitter)

X, formally known as Twitter, was purchased by Elon Musk in 2023 and was officially rebranded as X.³¹ Since its release in 2006, the social media app has garnered widespread popularity. Users can post tweets containing text, images, videos, and links, limited to 280 characters. X allows users to follow other accounts and receive updates from them in their personalized timelines. X functions as a platform for individuals, organizations, and businesses alike to disseminate information, participate in discussions, voice opinions, and stay informed on diverse topics of interest.

X profiles include various elements found in other popular social media profiles, including a profile picture, a cover photo, a brief bio, a URL, a date of birth, and a user's location. While users are not required to provide all of this information, they have the option to do so.

X is commonly used by individuals to discuss ideas, trends, and current events. These are often posted in real-time on the platform as incidents occur. Furthermore, hashtags are commonly used on this platform to create different communities that discuss topics under the same heading. The effectiveness of showcasing world events in real-time on X is extremely helpful for SS/TA teams, as well as the hashtags feature.

FEATURES OF X

Hashtags (#)

Hashtags are a pivotal tool for categorizing content and fostering discussions around specific topics. School administrators should be aware of how hashtags can influence student interactions and the visibility of posts.

When using hashtags, today's youth can join larger conversations, connect over shared interests, or engage in trends relevant to their personal lives. However, hashtags also make posts more discoverable, potentially exposing individuals to a wider audience. Understanding the use of hashtags can provide insights into popular trends, concerns, or topics circulating within a school community, aiding educators in addressing relevant issues and promoting a positive digital environment. A hashtag is a symbol added before a word or phrase to create a searchable category indexed by social media (in this case, X) and becomes searchable by other accounts.

Instagram, X, and TikTok are platforms where hashtags are most commonly used. When a user clicks on a hashtag, they will be shown other posts and profiles where that same hashtag was used.

Verified Accounts



Checkmarks

Blue or Gold Checkmark -   

While browsing X, users may come across accounts with a blue checkmark beside the username. These are called Verified Accounts. The blue checkmark denotes that the account has an active subscription to X Premium and meets the [eligibility requirements](#) to obtain a verified account.³² The Gold checkmark indicates the account is an official organization, and a grey checkmark indicates the account represents a government/multilateral organization or official.³³

In April of 2023, X began winding down their legacy Verification program, and accounts that were verified under the previous criteria (active, notable, and authentic) no longer retain a blue checkmark unless they are subscribed to X Premium.³²

Explore Page

The Explore Page is a feature tailored to highlight trending content, including tweets, news, and topics currently popular, either locally or globally. The Explore Page is curated based on user interactions and interests. This page provides school administrators with valuable insights into what topics students may be engaging in. By understanding the dynamics of the Explore Page, school administrators can gain a broader understanding of trends that could impact school culture and student behavior, while also remaining informed about discussions relevant to their school community.

Direct Messages (DMs)

Direct Messages, or DMs, allow users to send and receive private messages with other users on X. Users can send messages, tweets, or media from their personal devices through this feature and have the ability to create group chats to facilitate larger conversations.

Bookmarks

Bookmarks are accessible only through device or account access and allow users to save tweets for future viewing. Users often save posts they enjoy or wish to reference later. Each user can only access their own bookmarked tweets.

Lists

Lists allow users to customize, organize, and prioritize tweets they see in their timeline. Users can join lists created by others or create lists of their own. Once a list is created, the owner of the list can then add or invite other users to join. Lists can either be public or private, depending on the preference of the creator.

Profile Page

A user's Profile Page shows everything the user has tweeted/retweeted, media they have posted, tweets or accounts they have liked, and any tweets they may have been mentioned in.

Discord

Discord, a free voice and text messaging application with over 150 million monthly active users, is available as a desktop, browser, and mobile application (iOS and Android).³⁴ Typically, Discord is used as a space for video gamers to converse, either by direct message, voice chat, or video chat. Discord is now used by various online communities such as YouTubers/Influencers, art communities, and is also known as a space to meet new people. Discord has over 150 million monthly active users, with over four *billion* server conversation minutes every day.³⁵

Within Discord, users can create or join Servers where they can invite individuals they would like to engage in conversation with. In addition to voice or video chat, users can also share their computer screens within Discord. Voice chat can be used as either an open mic or push-to-talk, a feature that only allows others to hear you by enabling voice via the designated button set by a user on their keyboard or mouse. Users can also share their computer screens with Discord.

Discord also offers a paid subscription service called Discord Nitro.³⁶ Discord Nitro allows users to access Discord upgrades such as increased upload limits, customized emojis, HD video streaming, access to games/activities, server boosts, custom profiles, and more. Below is a video illustrating how Discord works.

FEATURES OF DISCORD

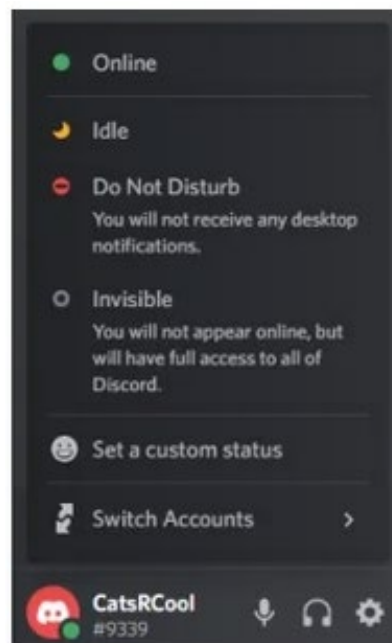
The general layout of most features on Discord is similar to chat features in applications such as Microsoft Teams or Slack, which are often used by businesses, schools, and organizations to communicate.

Status Icon

The status icon is located at the bottom left corner of the app and is attached to the user's avatar or profile photo. Clicking on the avatar will open a menu allowing a user to change their status to either online, idle, do not disturb, or invisible. Users can also create a custom status to reflect what activity they are engaging in, what music they are listening to (by connecting with applications such as Spotify or Apple Music), or which game they are playing. If the custom status option is chosen, this gives other users the ability to join the games the user is playing or even listen along to the music they are listening to.

Username

Beside a user's avatar is their username. In the example shown on the right, we can see the username of this user is CatsRCool#9339. Discord usernames are unique in the sense that the username (in this case, CatsRCool) can be changed as many times as the user wishes without any cool-off period, and for free. The ability to freely change a username can make it difficult for SS/TA teams to identify individual user accounts. Remember the difference between a username and a vanity name, though – the username will also be unique in the sense that only one individual on Discord can have that username.



Chat Feature

Discord's chat features can be used in multiple ways, including direct messaging (DMs). From the home screen, located in the top left corner of the Discord application, users can see all DMs received from friends they have added. They can also see DMs from users they have not added as friends if their account settings allow for it.

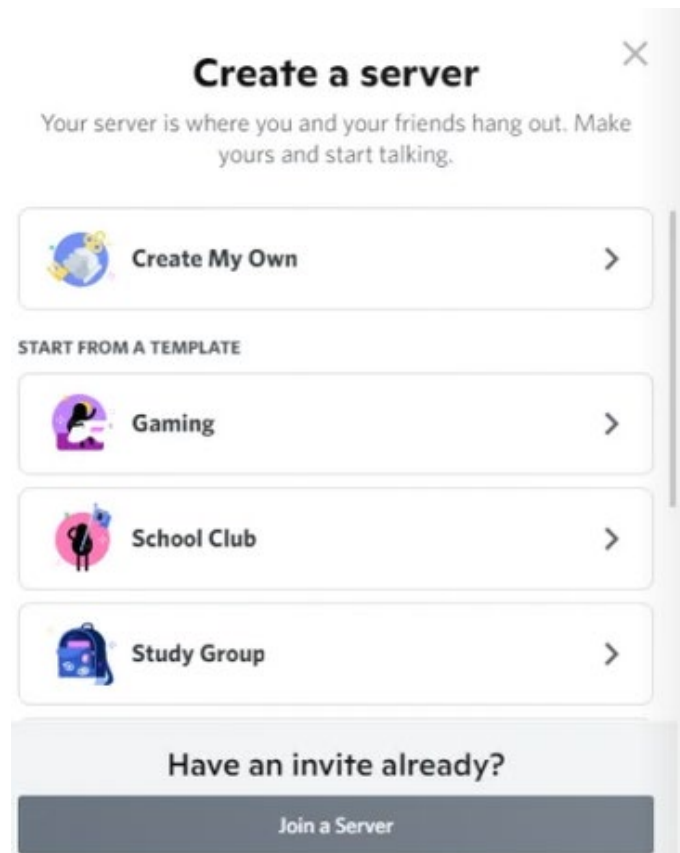
DMs can include one-on-one chats between users or group chats with multiple users. Discord allows for up to ten users in a single DM group chat. Regardless of user privacy settings, a user does not have to be friends with other users in DM group chats to interact in the group chat.

DMs and group DMs both have the same chat features and capabilities. Users can send messages, add emojis, stickers, and GIFs, send files, start voice calls, or start video calls. Voice and video calls can be conducted within a group DM with all users; however, not all users have to be in the call for it to stay active.

Creating a Server

If users wish to have more than ten members interacting with each other, they may either join or create a server. A server is a centralized communication channel that can be used for multiple purposes. Third-party applications and bots can also be used to bring in different elements to the server, such as polls, ticket submissions, chat games, helping moderate chat from spam or inappropriate content, and more.

To create a server, users can either create their own from scratch or start from a template pre-programmed in the application. Users can name the server any name they want, which can be changed at any time by users who have permission to do so.



Vault Apps

Vault apps are mobile applications designed to hide private photos, videos, files, or other applications on a device, usually by using the icon of another app, such as a calculator, camera, or notes. Vault apps are popular amongst teens to protect their mobile privacy by using app locking, private bookmarks, incognito browsing, cloud backup, and more. However, teens should be reminded that using technology is a privilege and they are not entitled to full privacy on their devices for their own safety.



DEVICE CAPABILITIES TO HIDE CONTENT

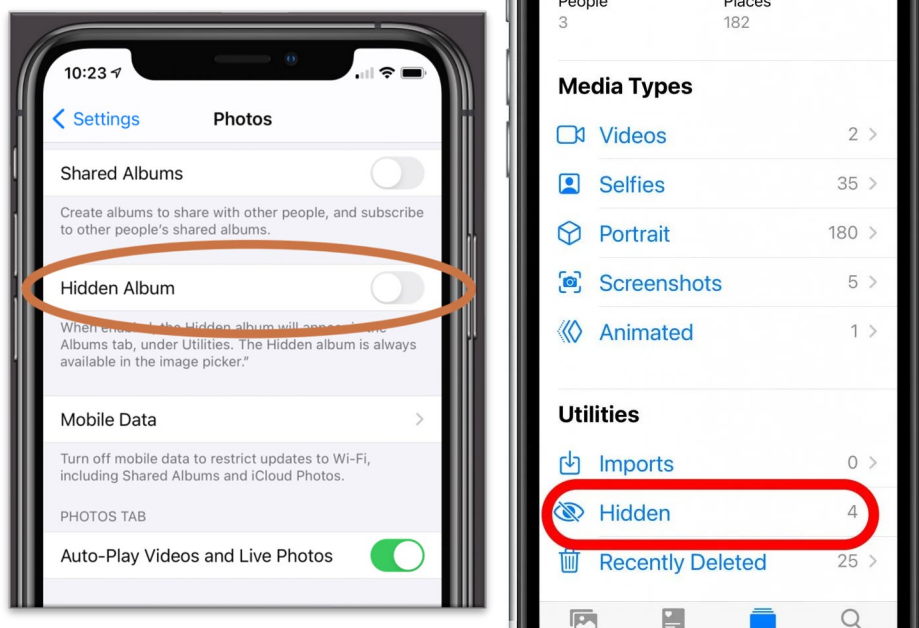
Android Secure Folder

The Secure Folder on an Android device is an encrypted space within a smartphone where the owner can store any content or data they want to keep private, including photos and videos. The Secure Folder can be located by selecting 'settings', then 'Biometrics and Security', then 'Secure Folder.' Users set up the Secure Folder by establishing a private access code. This can be in the form of a swipe pattern, 4 or 6-digit PIN, password, or fingerprint.

iPhone Hidden Album

The main purpose of the Hidden Album feature on an iPhone is to conceal photos and videos from being seen by the person who is in viewing the device. Previously, any users who were in control of an unlocked iPhone could locate photos in the Hidden album, so long as they knew how to navigate to this location. However, iOS 16 has implemented a default setting that locks the Hidden and Recently Deleted albums; Because of this new security feature, Face ID, Touch ID, or the device's passcode is required to access these files.³⁷

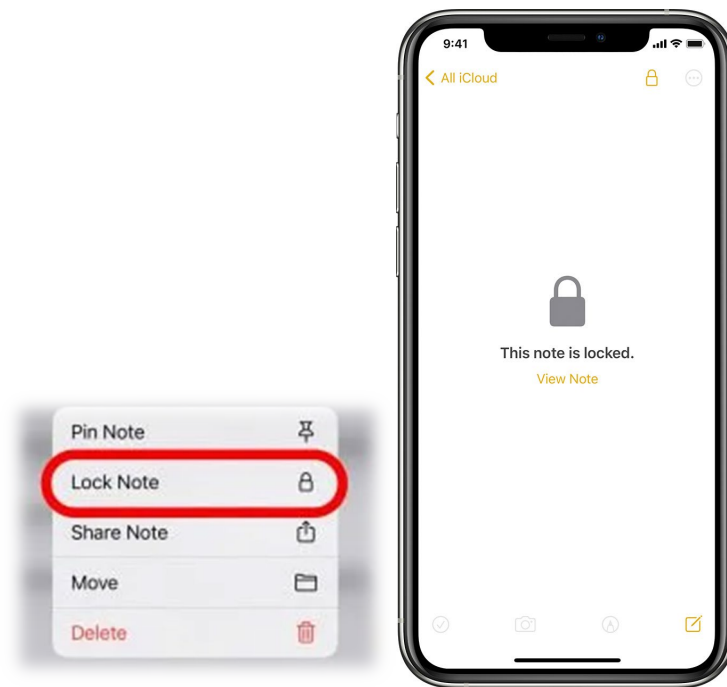
My Eyes Only

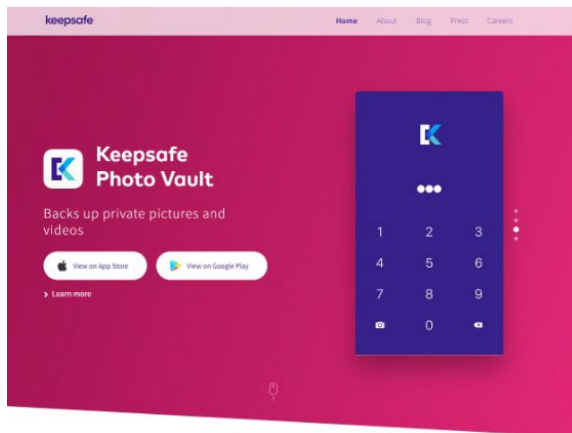
iPhone Notes Feature

Another way to hide or secure files on an iPhone is by utilizing the device's Notes application. A lot of people do not know this, but you can store digital files such as documents, photos, and videos within the Notes app.

Apple allows users to secure some of this content by "locking" the note and enabling a password-protected privacy wall. Now, sometimes the nuances of these features may change over time; however, as of the most recent iOS update, Apple does not allow users to lock a note if it contains video or audio files. However, the note can be locked if it contains photos.



In addition to these options, you should be aware of two vault apps that are quite common for students to use. One is Keepsafe³⁸, and another is Private Photo Vault.³⁹ It is important to note that for Keepsafe, if you input the passcode wrong when prompted, the app will take a photo from the front-facing camera; therefore, the next time the person logs into the app, they will receive a photo of you alerting them that you tried to access their vault app.

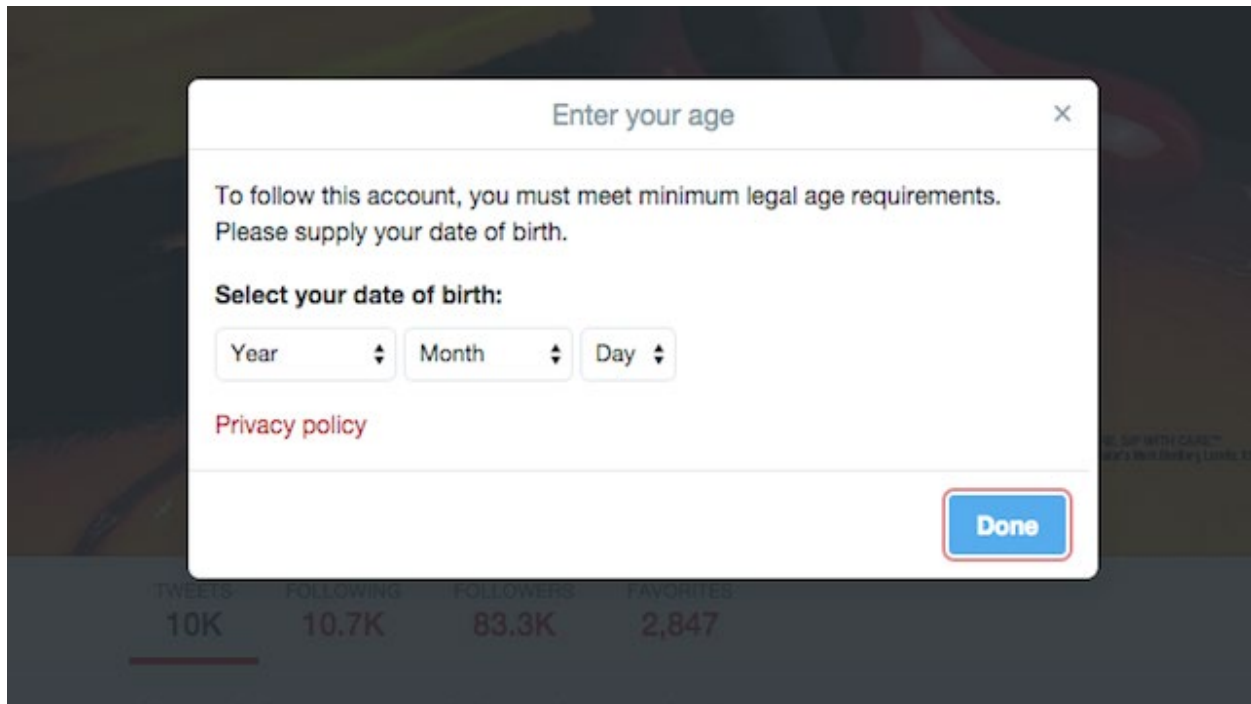
